The Hon'ble Mr. McPherson replied:—

"(a) As financial considerations make it impossible to place more than 13 of the 39 headmasters and Deputy Inspectors in the Provincial Educational Service at present, some of the Deputy Inspectors will necessarily remain, who are otherwise fit for promotion, in the Subordinate Educational Service in their present posts.

"(b) Selections have not yet been made but in any case Government cannot enter into a discussion of their reasons for appointing or not appointing

any particular officer.

"(c) The criterion will be that no officer can be appointed permanently to the Provincial Educational Service till he has satisfied Government by his ability, industry and character that he is suitable for appointment to that

The Hon'ble Babu Adit Prashad Singh asked:—

"In reply to the question of the Hon'ble Rai Bahadur Sharat Chandra Promotions of Sen regarding the L. T. and B. T. examinations, the Hon'ble Mr. Nathan Subinspectors of Was pleased to say at the meeting of the Council held on 17th January 1914, Schools. that "the candidates for the Licentiate in Teaching are required to answer a paper on English of the same standard as the B.A. pass course."

"Will the Government be pleased to state whether in promotions a Sub-Inspector of Schools who has passed the I. A. examination and the Licentiate in Teaching examination is, on account of his knowledge of English equal to the B. A. standard as well as his successful training in the Government training college, considered superior to an untrained officer who has only passed the B. A. examination? If not, what is the relative worth of their qualifications?"

The Hon'ble Mr. McPherson replied :-

"Training is certainly regarded as an important qualification, but the relative claims of officers to promotion depend on many considerations other than their academical qualifications and it is impossible to lay down any general rule on the subject."

The Hon'ble Babu Adit Prashad Singh asked :-
